MEETINGS

September

ssociate Professor Greg de Moore was our guest speaker last month, when his topic was "Lithium and Bi-Polar Disorder". This was the story of a little known Australian doctor, John Cade, and his discovery of the use of lithium to treat Bi-Polar Disorder, formerly known as Manic Depression. Lithium is the 3rd element in the Periodic Table. Its Atomic Weight is 6.940 and was discovered by Dr Arfvedson in 1817.

It had no treatment prior to the use of Lithium and has no cure. It is a mood disorder, oscillating between high and low—from grandiose to deep depression. About 20% of sufferers commit suicide.

John Frederick Joseph Cade was born in Murtoa in Victoria on 18 January 1912 to David and Ellen Cade. David was Murtoa's GP. He served at Gallipoli and France in World War I in the 1st 9th Field Ambulance. He suffered shell shock and returned home, finding it difficult to continue as a GP. He sold his practice and found employment in the Victorian Mental Hygiene Department. David became the Medical Superintendent at many of Victoria's Mental Hospitals and so John and his siblings grew up in that environment. John looked on the patients as people.

He was educated at Scotch College and graduated in 1928 and went to the University of Melbourne to study medicine, graduating with honours in 1933. He thought about becoming a Paediatrician, but while he was at the Royal Children's Hospital he suffered *pnremococcal pneumonia*. While convalescing he fell in love with one of the nurses and married her in 1937.

Like his father, John left his young family and enlisted in World War II. He became a POW in Changi from February 1942 until September 1945. It was during this time that he observed inmates having strange, vacillating experiences. He had the idea that a toxin was affecting their brains and when it was eliminated through their urine, they lost the symptoms.

After recuperating back home he accepted a position as a Psychiatrist at Bundoora Repatriation Mental Hospital, where, in an unused kitchen, he experimented with Lithium Carbonate (Li₂CO₃) to treat this type of strange behaviour. He used guinea pigs in his crude experiments, injecting urine from mentally ill patients into the pigs. His studies suggested urine from manic

patients was more toxic. There are two toxins in urine—urea and uric acid (2,6,8-Trioxypurine). The affect in the former was constant irrespective of the mental state of the patient, so he looked at uric acid as being the possible source of finding a treatment. Uric acid is not soluble in water but if it is treated with a lithium salt it creates lithium urate (LiHC₅H₂N₄O₃). Lithium had been used to treat gout (an inflammation of the foot caused by uric acid) in the 19th Century. He found pigs injected with Lithium Carbonate were more restful. By using careful controls in his experiments he found that the Lithium ion by itself had the calming effect. To ensure its safety, John injected himself.

He began treating the most severe case of manic depression at the Bundoora Hospital, Bill Brown. He was out of control. In March 1948, Bill was injected with either Lithium Carbonate or Lithium Citrate. The result was dramatic and Bill walked out of the hospital within 3 months. Ten other patients gave the same response and went back to work. However, Lithium is also a toxic element and if overdosed can lead to death.

We very sincerely thank Greg for coming and enlightening us on a man who should more well known than he is.

ark Bundy is our guest speaker today, when his topic will be "The 150-year History of Rookwood Cemetery". He tells the story behind its development and evolution, including its significant link to our nation's heritage. He conducts Historic Talks which include a screening of historic videos, which showcase Rookwood's 150-year history, notable and notorious characters interred within, and the story behind Rookwood's Mortuary Stations.

udy Tenzing will be our guest speaker next month on Monday, 11 November 2019, when her topic will be "A Tail of the Himalaya". Judy is an adventurer, tour leader, author and lecturer on the history and culture of India and the Himalaya. After a decade spent living and working there, she returned to Australia with her then new husband Tashi Tenzing, grandson of Everest's first summiter Tenzing Norgay. They established a small travel agency in Sydney specialising in India and the Himalaya, which she still runs.

Having lived and worked as an administrator and tour operator for over 30 years she has gained a knowledge of and love for the region that permeates all aspects of her life. With an academic background in South Asian history, Judy has lectured on the history and cultures of this region.

She is the author, with her former husband Tashi Tenzing, of the definitive book on Sherpa mountaineering history *Tenzing and the Sherpas of Everest*, which has been translated into seven languages and was published worldwide. She is now working on a new book on India and World War II.

Judy combines her life as a dedicated Indophile with her role as mother to her son Pasang and daughter Dechen. She travels frequently to India, Bhutan and Nepal and maintains close ties with their wonderful people.
