utstanding balances \$2,515 per person (plus \$505 single supplement) for this tour are payable at the March meeting.


India's Golden Triangle & Tiger—31 August–8 Sept. 2020

MEETINGS

February

atrick Dodd was our guest speaker last month, when his topic was "The Governor's Travels—touring the colony with Lachlan and Elizabeth Macquarie". Patrick described Lachlan and his wife as "the Dynamic Duo". Lachlan became the Governor of NSW by accident. In 1809, following Bligh's removal along with the Rum Corp, Brigadier-General Miles Nightingall was appointed the Governor and the Black Watch Regiment, of which Major Lachlan Macquarie was the Commanding Officer, was sent to NSW to maintain order. Nightingall fell ill before departure and Macquarie was named as his replacement.

Within 3 months of his arrival Macquarie established the "Fair Go" principle, whereby everybody, irrespective of being free settler or convict, were treated equally. He laid out the street pattern of Sydney and the houses were numbered (although this did not occur until the 1920s in most suburbs—being given names instead. The Editor's home in Eastwood was not numbered until about 1925).

Macquarie rebuilt Parramatta Road and it became a Toll road. A picnic day was held at Government House and in 1810 the markets were moved from Circular Quay to the present Queen Victoria Building site.

From 6 November to 13 December 1810 Macquarie made the first inspection of the Interior of the Colony, travelling to the Cowpastures and the Hawkesbury. He went to Van Diemen's Land from 4 November 1811 to 6 January 1812 and followed this by a visit to the "Newly Discovered Country"

CYCLE GROUP

here were 7 riders on Friday, 21 February 2020 our first ride this year. We met at Mill Point Street, Rhodes and rode along the Parramatta River cycle path past the Armoury café, over Silverwater Bridge and on to Parramatta Park before riding back to Parramatta Wharf where we had coffee. Our return journey was via the cycle path to Meadowbank, over the old railway bridge and returning to Mill Point, a total of 26 km.

over the Blue Mountains from 25 April to 19 May 1815 (note exactly 100 years before Gallipoli and the ANZACs). From 3 October to 12 October 1815 he revisited the Cowpastures and other parts of the Interior. He went to Newcastle from 27 July to 9 August 1818 and to the Western and Southern Countries, including Goulburn and Lake George from 16 October to 6 November 1820. He returned to Van Diemen's Land from 4 April to 12 July 1821. He travelled to Port Macquarie and Newcastle from 1 November to 21 November 1821 and to Bathurst again from 15 December 1821 to 17 January 1822. He made the decisions to travel to these placed and went, asking permission afterwards.

Throughout all of this he was greatly supported by his wife Elizabeth. She was his 2nd wife and his cousin (née Elizabeth Henrietta Campbell). They married in November 1807 (his 1st wife Jane Jarvis, whom he married in 1793, died in 1796). Elizabeth had seven miscarriages before Lachlan Junior was born on 28 March 1814.

The crossing of the Blue Mountains in 1815 by Gregory Blaxland, William Lawson and William Charles Wentworth via Cox's Road from Emu Ford to Bathurst was instrumental in Macquarie's visit to the "Newly Discovered Country". A large celebration was held in 2015 to mark the bicentenary at the exact locations of the original journey.

However, the free settlers complained to the Home Country about Macquarie's style of leadership and a British Judge John Brigge was sent to NSW in 1819 to make a report. It was adverse for the administration and Macquarie resigned in 1822 partly due to failing health. He died back in London on 1 July 1824 and is buried along with his wife and son on the Isle of Mull in Scotland, near where he was born on 31 January 1762. He was the 5th Governor of NSW and the last autocratic one.

We very sincerely thank Patrick for coming of telling about Lachlan and Elizabeth Macquarie and their journeys around the then Colony of NSW.

ilini Manthilaka is our guest speaker today, when her topic will be "Agerelated Macular Degeneration (AMD)". Dilini works for the Macular Disease Foundation Australia (MDFA) and is coming to tell us more about AMD and show us how to try and preserve our sight. Over the age of 50, ½ of the population are diagnosed with AMD and ½ over the age of 80.

The Macular Disease Foundation Australia can show how to try and preserve one's sight through some very simple techniques and lifestyle changes. Attendees will have the opportunity to learn more about AMD, its symptoms, risk factors and treatment options and management. The main focus of our presentation is to encourage positive lifestyle changes. MDFA

provides free information kits with a wealth of resources for every attendee as well as a home monitoring tool.

He was promoted to Major in 2013 and later deployed as the Financial Advisor in Iraq in 2015. In 2017 he was the primary Financial Advisor on the Field Training Exercise. In 2020, he was posted on promotion to Lieutenant Colonel to Headquarters 17th Sustainment Brigade.

In his civilian life, he is a criminal investigator with the NSW Police Force, holding the rank of Detective Senior Constable. He has been posted to the Eastwood Local Area Command, South East Asian Crime Squad, Gangs Squad, Homicide Squad and is currently posted to the Cybercrime Squad, State Crime Command. He holds a Bachelor of Commerce with an Accounting major, Diploma of Policing and Advanced Diploma of Public Safety (Criminal Investigation). He is currently studying in the Certified Practicing Accountant (CPA) Programme.

He is married to Stefanie, who is an IT system specialist and they recently became parents to a daughter, Alexandra. His interests include travel, running, golf and military history.

ext month's outing is on Wednesday, 8 April 2020 and is a visit to the Sydney Observatory. A range of tours are available, and it appears that the most interesting is the 1 o'clock tour entitled "Bigger than Big: Discover the scale of the Universe in this 3-D Space Theatre show". The tour will go for approximately 40 minutes. The telescope tour includes viewing of the Sun; weather permitting, from the dome. The cost is \$10 per person, and we will book and pay on arrival.

The Sydney Observatory is at 1003 Upper Fort Street., Millers Point. It is a bit of a walk, uphill, from the nearest railway station, Circular Quay.

We will assemble at Epping Station Concourse at 11.15 a.m. to catch the 11.32 a.m. train on platform 1, arriving at Central on Platform 16 at 12.10 p.m. We will then catch the next train to Circular Quay from platform 17.
