ieutenant Colonel Andrew Lam was our guest speaker last month, when his topic was "A Modern Day ANZAC". The Modern Day Anzac is very different from the original Anzacs. They age between 19 and 30, while in

1914–15 ages went up to forty-five. Today they are full-time Professionals or Reservists like Andrew, while in 1914 they were untrained volunteers. He has served in Solomon Islands, East Timor and Iraq.

Andrew gave a power point presentation of the action during his time with the ADF in Iraq. The Iraq/Syrian War of 2014–15 arose due to the rise of Daesh. According to Arabic Translator Alice Guthrie: "D.A.E. SH is a transliteration of the Arabic acronym formed of the same words that make up I.S.I.S. in English: 'Islamic State in Iraq and Syria'".

The operation was titled "Operation Okra". It also involved the RAAF and Special Forces. Their duty was to advise and assist (advise—facilitate and influence by means of counsel and dialogue; assist—provision of direct and indirect enabler support to enhance planning and conduct of operations). The actual fighting to remove Daesh was the responsibility of the Iraqi Army.

ISIS came to be in control in January of 2015. Andrew displayed a map of the fall of ISIS, with the last territory it held occurred in March 2019.

However, the modern veteran and their problems, medical and mental, must be continually in our thoughts and prayers—LEST WE FORGET.

We very sincerely thank Andrew for coming and giving us such a graphic insight into the Iraqi War.

avid Rosenberg is our guest speaker today, when his topic will be "Pine Gap, the Inside Story". He was employed as a civilian by the United States National Security Agency (NSA) for 23 years, completing his last 18 years with the Agency managing his team in Operations at the Joint Defence Facility Pine Gap in Alice Springs. When he left in 2008, he was the United States Government's longest serving Technical Liaison Officer in Australia. He became a dual Australian citizen in 2009.

David was trained in Electronic Intelligence (ELINT) and has over 20 years experience in the Signals Intelligence (SIGINT) community, evaluating the function, capabilities, performance, and vulnerability assessment of all types of radar, associated weapon systems such as Surface-to-Air Missiles (SAMs), ballistic missiles, and cruise missiles, and countermeasure techniques/tactics. He has 18 years experience with all aspects of satellite surveillance resources, assets, equipment, and recording techniques and over 20 years experience in the production and reporting of intelligence across the global Intelligence Community.

On 1 October 2018, Hardie Grant Publishers released his book, *Pine Gap: The Inside Story Of The NSA In Australia*, the first book about the NSA's operations at a satellite ground site by an individual who held the Top Secret security clearance that allowed him to work inside Operations. His

Beth has been a member of the Parramatta & District Historical Society for 28 years, and she is currently on the Research Committee. She was a volunteer at Parramatta Heretic Centre for 16 years until ill health forced her retirement.

These days she is a member of the Parramatta Female Factory Friends, doing the research with Anne Matthews. When they began, they had an exhibition called "Women Transported" and they had 800 names. The exhibition toured Australia. Anne and Beth received an NSW Volunteer Award in 2009 for their hard work putting this exhibition together.

Beth, with Ann is still researching these women and they call them "Our Girls" and now have 3.000 names, using the name of the ship of arrival as ID. Many are still a mystery. They use the NSW State Archives for the original records; other family historians generously share their own records.

These women, who were often unnamed in History such as "his wife" or "the wife of", were the backbone of our nation and we believe their stories should be better known.

Many of the Female Factory buildings are still standing, often under threat of development. Open days and conducted tours are organised on a regular basics.

his month's outing is on Monday, 17 May 2021, and is a visit to the Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation (ANSTO) at Lucas Heights. The 2½-hour tour will cost \$15, and we will pay on the day.

ANSTO is the home of Australia's most significant national infrastructure for research. Thousands of scientists from industry and academia benefit from gaining access to state-of-the-art instruments every

year. It operates much of Australia's landmark infrastructure including one of the world's most modern nuclear research reactors, OPAL; a comprehensive suite of neutron beam instruments; the Australian Synchrotron; the National Imaging Facility Research Cyclotron; and the Centre for Accelerator Science.

The ANSTO site is a secure site. The ANSTO Visitor Information Fact Sheet outlines information that visitors need to provide prior to the visit. If you wish to join the tour, you are requested to read the ANSTO Visitor Information Fact Sheet including the ANSTO Visitor Terms and Conditions. The Outings Co-ordinator will have a printed copy of the web sites to view the documents at the Probus meeting on 10 May 2021.

To visit ANSTO, please provide the Outings Co-ordinator with the information required for the ANSTO Tour Booking Sheet for both members and guests BEFORE the end of the Probus meeting on Monday, 10 May 2021.

Please note that there are high magnetic fields in certain areas. The Meetings organiser is asked to advise ANSTO "if any members of [the] group have medical conditions, mobility challenges or other special needs that we should be aware of. For example, cochlear implants, pacemakers, hearing problems, use of walking sticks or wheelchairs, etc."

As public transport to ANSTO is not feasible, we will car-pool, so we arrive at ANSTO at 10.00 a.m. Lunch will be on-site, at the ANSTO Café.
