MEETINGS

September

en Moroney was our guest speaker last month. Ken began by recounting his family tree beginning with his Great Grandfather, a member of the Irish Police force, who arrived in Australia with his family in 1890. However, Ken's Grandfather was an SP Bookmaker.

Ken grew up in the country region of NSW and after high school elected to join the NSW Police Force. He began his training at the Redfern Academy on 16 August 1965. After 5 weeks he graduated as a Probationary Constable and was sent to Liverpool Police Station. Areas such as Green Valley (Dodge City) were located in the area under the oversight of that Station. The men he worked with were mainly ex-servicemen, who had attended the "University of Hard Knocks". He learnt very early the importance of "respect".

From Liverpool he began his stint in Country NSW, being sent to Lismore and then West Wyalong. He moved up through the ranks in the usual way before being singled out in 1987 and appointed Deputy Principal (Director of Recruit Training) at the Goulburn Police Academy (some years earlier it replaced Redfern as the Police Training facility). Here he had the rank of Superintendent.

In 1999, he and his family moved to Sydney when he was appointed Deputy Commissioner. In 2002, the NSW Government appointed him the 19th NSW Police Commissioner. He retired from the NSW Police Force in 2007.

He discussed the politics of the policing—tools v people. He maintained that the Police Force could survive on fewer numbers of intakes but needed more modern technical resources. The aim should be to introduce the fear of crime, thereby reducing the happening of crime.

Ken covered one or two areas of well known events in which he was personally involved—such as the Strathfield Plaza murders, for which there was no debriefing. He then discussed the methods of solving anti social behaviour and preventing crime.

Ken said he had respect for the Parole Board in the difficulties it faced in determining whether a prisoner should be released or not. He stated that there has to be a better way, a better system.

He them told us that the best solution lay in the Probus meeting—grandparents. The word "respect" is very necessary today in our Society—respect by the Police Officer dealing with a situation, respect within the family. Society is looking desperately for role models, because of huge lack. The best role models are grandparents.

We very sincerely thank Ken for coming and outlining for us what he experienced in the NSW Police Force—rising from the bottom to lead it for 5 years—what he now does in retirement with his company Nemesis.

es Fenech from the Parramatta & District Historical Society is our guest speaker today, when his topic will be "The History of Telecommunications". Les has worked in Telecommunications with Telecom, Telstra, OTC and Optus. These inventions were some of the key technologies that advanced the speed of our communications, can you sense the euphoria of such an occasion. This year marks 150 years of such an event.
