wship, Friendship and Fun

Robin Best was our guest speaker last month on Monday, 5 June 2023, when his topic was "An Historic event in Pennant Hills in 1905". Rod began by talking about the existence of Chinese Market Gardens in Beecroft in the 1800s and early 1900s. They were principally located along Copeland Road East. The Chinese who worked these gardens also became gardeners to the households of Beecroft, Pennant Hills and Thornleigh. One of these gardeners was Charlie John Tye, who had been living in the area for about 20 years and was well known and liked. He had recently worked at Riverview Catholic College in Hunters Hill and the Hampden Hotel in Pennant Hills.

However, in August 1906 he was doing it tough. He was without employment or somewhere to live. On 13 August 1906, he slept in the bush in a tent belonging to fellow Chinese gardener Joe Young, on Mr Garrett's property *Loch Maree* in Thornleigh. He left the next morning but returned the next day to Joe's tent. That afternoon he left for Thornleigh Station with Yee Sam, another Chinese gardener. They purchased their tickets but as the train arrived Charlie had a mental episode and pulled out a tomahawk he was carrying in a bag and attacked John Hockley, a slaughterman employed by Mr Pollard at Thornleigh. Hockley had his back to Tye when attacked and was struck a glancing blow to his head cutting him just above the right eye. Tye took another swing with the tomahawk but Hockley moved just enough so the blade only split his coat.

Bedlam took place and Hockley took off to seek medical attention while Tye fled across the line to The Esplanade. He subsequently murdered two schoolboys, 9 year-old Albert Gordon Pettet and 15 year-old Horace Aitken. Tye then hid in a nearby house and when the police arrived he was trying to burn it down. He was overpowered by the two Constables and taken by train to Ryde Police Station and Lockup.

He subsequently appeared in court on the Murder and attempted Murder charges but they were dismissed on Mental Health Grounds. He lived out his life at the Parramatta Mental Hospital.

Rod then told a story of the back ground of Sir Leslie Joseph Hooker and his connection with the Chinese Market Gardens in Beecroft. He was born on 18 August 1903 at Canterbury to Ellen Tingyou, who was unmarried. They lived with his grandfather James Tingyou and extended family at Beecroft. He went to Beecroft Primary School.

He began working at the age of 13 and three years later bought land at Blacktown. So began his life in Real Estate. He changed his name to Hooker in 1925 to circumvent the *White Australia Policy*.

We sincerely thank Rod for coming and relating to us the Chinese in Beecroft and neighbouring suburbs.
